MARCH MADNESS PREDICTIONS

Somebody who is perfect when it comes to predictions is God. We are reminded of this truth in the stories we just celebrated last week on Good

Friday and Easter Sunday. In the Gospel-writer Luke's telling of what happened when the women arrived at the tomb early that Sunday morning, we are reminded how it was predicted Jesus would arise on the third day:

"Why are you looking among the dead for someone who is alive? He isn't here! He is risen from the dead! Remember what He told you back in Galilee, that the Son must be betrayed into the hands of sinful men and be crucified, and that He would rise again on the third day. (Luke 24:5-7)

This prediction was made even before the events of Jesus' death on the cross played out. When we see predictions like this fulfilled and come true in the Bible, it reminds us how God faithfully keeps His promises. It is important for us to understand that God's predictions are in fact promises that He always keeps. By understanding this truth, it provides us with so much peace and assurance. The apostle Paul understood this when he wrote in Philippians 4: 12-13:

I have learned the secret of living in every situation, whether it is with a full stomach or empty, with plenty or little. For I can do everything through Christ, who gives me strength.

Paul understood the key to being content and at peace in every situation was to *rely on God's promises and His power* to help and strengthen him. As we come out of Easter and continue into this season of predictions being made, may we follow Paul's example here by holding onto the truth that *God always keeps His promises* and by so doing we are confident that the strength our risen Lord provides us with will help us through every circumstance.
